

A Bit of St Johns History

The conflict between cowboys and sheep men came to a battle on June 24, 1882. During the celebration of El Dia de San Juan, the day the Spanish/Catholic community honors their patron saint, San Juan Bautista. It began with a Procession and Mass, and a Fiesta with dancing, food and music. In 1882, the people had brought in a torrero from Mexico for a bull-fight.

The Greers, cattlemen from Texas, and some of their cowboys decided to go to the bullfight, as they had never seen one. Sheriff Tomas Perez, sensing trouble, asked them to come unarmed. They ignored this and came well armed.

The fiesta erupted into a gunfight between the Spanish men and the Texans. Spanish shooters took cover in the Barth Hotel, and the Texans ran into the old Sherwood home, next to current day Nielsen Well Drilling Bldg, exchanging gunfire. Two of the Greer cowboys were wounded and one was killed.

After 15-20 minutes of gunfire, 70 year old Nathan Tenney walked up the street waving a white flag. When shooting halted, he went to the adobe house and talked the Greers into surrendering. They agreed, but when he walked out the door, he was shot in the head and died instantly.
